

DASA Overview

Purpose:

The Dignity for All Students Act (often referred to as "DASA" or "The Dignity Act") is a New York state law that intends to create a learning environment for ALL students that is free from discrimination, intimidation, taunting, harassment, and bullying on school property, a school bus, and/or at a school function. (including cyberbullying).



N.Y. Educ. § Law 13:

"No student shall be subjected to harassment or bullying by employees or students on school property or at a school function; nor shall any student be subjected to discrimination based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender, or sex by school employees or students on school property or at a school function."




Harassment and Bullying Definitions Educ. Law §11(7):

"Harassment" and "Bullying" shall mean the creation of a hostile environment by conduct or by threats, intimidation or abuse (verbal or nonverbal), including cyberbullying, that...

 Has or would have the effect of unreasonably and substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities or benefits, or mental, emotional or physical well-being; or



- Reasonably causes or would reasonably be expected to cause a student to fear for his or her physical safety; or
- Reasonably causes or would reasonably be expected to cause physical injury or emotional harm to a student; or
- Occurs off school property and creates or would foreseeably create a risk of substantial disruption within the school environment, where it is foreseeable that the conduct, threats, intimidation or abuse might reach school property.



Amendments:

- DASA was amended in 2018 to specify that gender includes gender identity and/or expression. The amendment also included illustrative examples of what should be reported.
- DASA was amended in 2021 to add definitions for the terms "race" and "protective hairstyles" in order to be consistent with The CROWN Act



Requirements:

- DASA Policies and Codes of Conduct
- Incident Reporting Form must be accessible on the District Website
- Dignity Act Coordinators (DAC)
 - One per school; names/info posted central location and website
- Annual school employee training
- Instruction in civility, citizenship, and character education



Requirements (cont.):

- Staff Reporting of Incidents
 - Orally report incident(s) within one (1) school day to principal, superintendent, or DAC
 - Report in writing within two (2) school days after making oral report
- Conduct a prompt and thorough investigation and make a determination
- Refer violations that constitute criminal activity to law enforcement
- Annual reporting to NYSED (SSEC)
