

# Leading THE WAY

Recognizing the everchanging nature of education, the district continues to embrace initiatives aimed at keeping its students ahead of the learning curve. The district has implemented Project Lead the Way, the nation's leading provider of STEM programs, into the curriculum for all students in grades K-5. It is also being integrated into all seventh grade technology classes and added as an elective course to replace grade seven study hall.

Project Lead the Way guides students to work collaboratively, identify problems and persevere through their challenges to find solutions, thereby leading their own learning. The program's instructional design focuses on real-world activities, projects and problems that help students understand how the knowledge and skills they develop in the classroom may be applied to everyday life.

At the elementary level, the PLTW Launch program taps into students' exploratory nature, engaging them in learning that feels like play and encouraging them to keep discovering. Twentyfour modules in the Launch program are aligned to give students a design-thinking mindset through compelling activities, projects and problems that build upon each other and relate to the world around them.

These school-wide, handson activities enrich instruction in areas such as computer science, engineering, and biomedical science and allow students to become creative, collaborative problem-solvers. For example, kindergarten students learn about structure and function by exploring the human body. They learn to assemble a skeleton and create a model X-ray of a hand. Fifth-grade students delve into robotics and automation by building and programming an autonomous robot designed to solve real-world problems.

PLTW further encourages exploration in the middle school years. The Gateway curriculum challenges and inspires middle school students with creative problem-solving activities. Smithtown has implemented the Gateway program for seventh-graders through the technology class Design and Modeling. It is also offered as a grade 7 elective in two specialized units:



Automation and Robotics and Flight and Space.

In the automation and robotics unit, learning includes designing, building and programming traffic lights, tollbooths and robotic arms. In the flight and space unit, students explore the science behind aeronautics, eventually building and designing an airfoil.

"The PLTW program helps build students' problem-solving skills through the application of language and math skills as well as technology, design, engineering and science," said Jennifer Bradshaw, assistant superintendent for instruction.

Thirty-one teachers and seven administrators throughout the district were provided with the training and resources of PLTW to engage students in the reinvention of the classroom experience. The district was able to support this initiative using one-time funding sources, turning short-term revenue into an exciting program that will continue to enrich instruction long after the funding is gone.




Mona Tobin, Assistant Superintendent for Pupil Personnel Services

School spirit soared in Smithtown on Sept. 24 as both high schools celebrated their homecoming.

High School East kicked off its festivities with a parade beginning at St. James Elementary. Heading down Lake Avenue, sports teams and clubs from East, Nesaquake and Great Hollow middle schools marched down to the East football field.

In lieu of a parade, High School West treated students and younger guests to a pre-game carnival. Games, face painting, rock climbing, an obstacle course and a dunk tank – complete with West faculty and administrators – were organized by many of the school's clubs and organization.

For the big game, East took on the Riverhead

Blue Waves, shutting them out 24-0. Despite their best efforts, the West varsity football team fell to the Thunderbirds from Half Hollow Hills East 41-14.

During July and August, the district was filled with activity as hundreds of students participated in programs at Smithtown Elementary School and Accompsett Middle School.

At Smithtown Elementary, K-8 students worked in small class settings as part of the Extended School Year Program. Students focused on academic goals and social-emotional skills in an effort to keep their educational and social abilities active during the summer months. This year's program was based on the Summer Olympics, which included activities such as an Olympic Field Day and carnival.

More than 100 K-8 students also participated in the summer reading program, which gave them an extra boost and helped hone their reading skills in preparation for the school year.

Four different camps were housed at Accompsett – Middle School CAMP (Character Academics Mindset Preparedness), English as a New Language, SCOPE Summer Enrichment and lessons through the Friends of Music of Smithtown.

Students sharpened their musical skills with one-on-one and group lessons sponsored by the Friends of Music of Smithtown. Students who are new to the English language polished their expertise during the summer months as well. The SCOPE program mixed fun and learning as students participated in hands-on activities in the arts, technology and science.

CAMP students spent the summer building their academic, creative, social and emotional skill sets. They learned about creative arts, mind-body medicine, positive psychology, nutrition, relationship development, resilience training, stress reduction, and movement and exercise. They practiced yoga, meditation, biofeedback technology and working collaboratively.

# Accolades and Achievements

Although it's only a few weeks into the new school year, Smithtown students are already achieving recognition for their accomplishments in the arts and academics.

#### National Merit Scholars

Eleven seniors are among 16,000 students across the country who were named semifinalists in the annual National Merit Scholarship Program.

From High School West, Samantha Catalano, Stephen Kyranakis, Victoria Savage, Adam Wang, Catherine Whang and Cory Zhou have been recognized as NMSP semifinalists.

Five High School East seniors have also made the list: Sanjana

Eranki, Emily Knott, Carley Rowe, Natalie Swiacki and Ruisi Zhong.

To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to finalist standing. Merit Scholars will be announced in February. These high school seniors will move on through the competition to potentially earn one of 7,500 National Merit scholarships worth about \$33 million that will be awarded next spring.





#### AP Scholars

The College Board recognized nearly 400 current and recently graduated students from both high schools as Advanced Placement Scholars.

The AP Scholar awards, which are divided into several categories, were bestowed upon the students based on their exceptional achievement on the AP exams given last spring.

- 157 students qualified for the AP Scholar Award by receiving a score of 3 or higher on three or more exams.
- 81 students received the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average score of 3.25 on all AP exams taken and grades of 3 or higher on four or more of those exams.
- 143 students qualified for the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken and grades of 4 or higher on five or more of those exams.
- 18 students received the highest designation of National AP Scholar by earning an average score of 4 or higher on all AP exams taken and scores of 4 or higher on eight or more of those exams.

AP courses completed with a score of 3 or higher on the final exam afford students the opportunity to earn college credit.

#### All-State Musicians

Fourteen students from High Schools East and West were chosen to perform in the All-State Festival at the New York State School Music Association Winter Conference, to be held Dec. 1-4 in Rochester, New York.

Four students from High School

West – Blake Carey, Leighann Guardino, Christine McAleer and Caitlin Unkenholz – were selected for inclusion in the All-State concert.

From High School East, 10 students were chosen to perform in the All-State concert: Jack Furci, Kylie Lavrenchick,

Max Lippman, Ryan MacCarthy, Aaron Min, Lolita Nazarov, Keisuke Setsu, Max Sherman, Brandon Star and Justin Wei.

These students were chosen among thousands of students who auditioned at NYSSMA solo and ensemble evaluation festivals throughout the state last spring.

# TEACHER SPOTLIGHT

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#### \*\*\*\*ECRWSS\*\*\*\* SMITHTOWN POSTAL CARRIER

Two award-winning and passionate teachers and researchers are at the helm of the district's science research programs at High Schools East and West. Their support and drive have taken the science programs to the next level by providing students with countless opportunities to succeed both in and out of the classroom.

#### Maria Zeitlin: East Science Research Coordinator

Since East began its research program in the fall of 2005, Maria Zeitlin has been guiding and mentoring her students. In 2007, the students she mentored were seniors who were eligible to submit their science research papers to national collegiate scholarship competitions. Ms. Zeitlin has since mentored three Intel Science Talent Search finalists. Additionally, she has mentored 10 Intel STS semifinalists,

three regional finalists in the Siemens Competition for Math, Science and Technology, three International Intel Science and Engineering Fair finalists, four finalists in the Young Epidemiology Scholars Competition and three Long Island Science Congress state finalists.

This past summer, Ms. Zeitlin traveled to Washington, D.C., where she was honored for the work of her students who won the Department of Energy BioenergizeME Infographic Challenge. Her students have recognized her contributions by nominating her three times as the Intel STS Most Influential Person for shaping their scientific careers. She has been awarded Teacher of the Year from Syracuse University Project Advance and received the Phi Delta Kappa Friends of Education Award from Stony Brook University.

#### Dr. Joanne Figueiredo: West Science Research Coordinator

Mentoring her students and guiding them to solve real-world issues are the main priorities for Dr. Joanne Figueiredo at High School West. The high school lab focuses on problems of emerging environmental relevance as well as evolutionary importance. Dr. Figueiredo assists students in developing projects that give them the ability to not only

conduct scientific projects, but also to get involved in impacting environmental policy at the local level.

A number of West students attended the Science Research Summer Institute at Brentwood High School, where they worked directly with Dr. Figueiredo and other mentors. West researchers collaborated with other high school students on a grant from the Suffolk County Legislature directed at finding ways to mitigate nitrogen levels in county salt marshes, lakes and rivers and improve environmental conditions. Under Dr. Figueiredo's tutelage, several West students have been awarded Simons Fellowships and worked with mentors at Stony Brook University.

## New Teachers Ovelcomed Cloard

Prior to the start of school, the district hosted approximately 50 teachers for three days during new teacher orientation. Kicking off with a breakfast hosted by the Smithtown Teachers' Association, the new teachers were introduced to district and building administrators and departmental directors. Faculty members also received a tour of their building and had time to meet with their building principals, participate in staff development and view their classrooms.
