SCHEDULING

- The Scheduling process for the next school year begins as early as December of the present school year.
- Counselors will advise students on how to begin inputting course requests.
 During this time students and parents are able to access their course requests from home via the Parent Portal.
- We encourage parents to read the <u>Program Guide</u> and ask any questions about the course selection process during this time. *An updated version will be available at a later date
- There will be plenty of time (approx. 3 months) to review, discuss and make alterations to selections, and then you will be asked to review the final receipt of course selections before the system locks
- Once courses selections are reviewed, there will be no changes permitted to elective requests or P.E. (See the Course Change Policy).

- Opportunities begin at local organizations such as hospitals, religious affiliations, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, town hall, nursing homes.
- Begin commitment in 9th grade and stay with the organization for 4 years. Each year, take on new responsibilities within the organization to show growth and leadership skills.
- Devote volunteer time to one or two organizations rather than multiple organizations. It's the "quality" of work, not "quantity."
- Keep a list of all extracurricular/volunteer activities beginning in grade 9.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

PLAN AHEAD - COLLEGE TESTING

- AP exams are scheduled in May
- PSAT is taken in October of junior and/or sophomore year
- SAT Reasoning Test and ACT are typically taken in the spring semester of the junior year
- Retake SAT/ACT, if necessary.
- College Testing Calendar available on website

^{*}Please note, these are private companies and there are additional costs attached to all of the above mentioned examinations.

COLLEGE TESTING: STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES (CLASSIFIED, DECLASSIFIED AND 504 STUDENTS:)

- College Board and ACT require a separate application for testing accommodations for students with disabilities.
- Classified Special Education students: College Board application is completed by student's primary teacher as early as 9th grade.
- Declassified and 504 students: College Board application is completed by student's School Counselor as early as 9th grade.
- ACT application is completed when the student registers for the ACT test in their junior year.
- Testing accommodations from College Board and ACT are <u>not guaranteed and</u> are <u>not immediate</u>. The testing company determines the eligibility.
