Grade 5 Summer Reading Assignment: Your goal is to make an interesting poster about this amazing story!

1.VISUALIZE: On the left side of the(11"X18") white construction paper: This story has many different settings. Illustrate the scene from the book that you think is the most important and write a caption for it. Draw as many details as you pictured in your mind as you read the story. Make it colorful and neat!

- 2. **RESPONDING**: Attach to the right side of the(11"X18") white construction paper: Please type your responses to the questions below. Be sure to include your full name on the assignment. You must use size 12 or 14 size font. Make sure you use all of the great paragraph writing strategies that you learned in 4th grade.
 - Paragraph 1: A character trait is a distinguishing quality of a character that affects how they think, feel, and behave. What are the main character's (Edward) traits? Name at least 3 traits and provide evidence from the text to support these traits. Be sure to think about his actions, thoughts and words.
 - Paragraph 2: The "theme" is the message/lesson that the author wants you to learn. What is the most important theme in <u>The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane</u>? Why? Be sure to provide text evidence to support your reasons.

Remember to...

- *Create clear TOPIC SENTENCES.
- *Include specific, relevant text-based details to support your answers.
- *Use transition words (First, Next, Then, Finally, In conclusion,).
- *Check your spelling, capitalization, and punctuation.
